

REMARKS BY THE HONOURABLE RENE BRUNELLE
TO THE CANADIAN CLUB, TORONTO -----
APRIL ¹⁴~~12~~, 1969.

I AM VERY PLEASED TO HAVE BEEN INVITED TO
SPEAK TO YOU TO-DAY AND WELCOME THE
OPPORTUNITY TO DISCUSS OUR PROVINCIAL PARKS
PROGRAM AND, MORE SPECIFICALLY, THE SUBJECT
OF ALGONQUIN PROVINCIAL PARK.

AS I'M SURE YOU ARE AWARE, ALGONQUIN PARK
HAS BEEN THE TOPIC OF MUCH LIVELY PUBLIC
DEBATE OVER THE PAST SIX MONTHS. THIS INDICATES,
I BELIEVE, THE VERY SPECIAL PLACE WHICH THIS
PARK HAS IN THE HEARTS OF A LARGE NUMBER OF
PEOPLE - NOT ONLY IN ONTARIO, BUT IN MANY OTHER
PARTS OF THE WORLD AS WELL. I CAN ONLY SAY THAT
THIS FEELING IS SHARED BY THOSE OF US IN
GOVERNMENT WHOSE RESPONSIBILITY IT IS TO CHART
THE FUTURE COURSE OF THIS OUTSTANDING AREA.

IN NOVEMBER OF LAST YEAR, MY DEPARTMENT
ANNOUNCED A PROVISIONAL MASTER PLAN FOR THE
PARK WHEREIN WE ATTEMPTED TO SUGGEST THE
POLICIES WHICH SHOULD GUIDE THE DEVELOPMENT

AND MANAGEMENT OF THE AREA. BECAUSE OF OUR CONCERN THAT THE PUBLIC HAVE FULL OPPORTUNITY TO PRESENT ITS VIEWS ON ALGONQUIN PARK, THREE PUBLIC HEARINGS WERE HELD AND WERE ATTENDED BY APPROXIMATELY 1000 PERSONS IN ALL. OVER 100 BRIEFS WERE PRESENTED, EITHER AT THE HEARINGS OR SENT BY MAIL; AND THE OPPORTUNITY WAS GIVEN FOR ALL INTERESTED PERSONS AND GROUPS TO PRESENT THEIR VIEWS. IN ADDITION TO THE BRIEFS, WE HAVE RECEIVED A VERY LARGE NUMBER OF LETTERS EXPRESSING OPINIONS ON THE PROVISIONAL PLAN AND OFFERING SUGGESTIONS FOR ITS IMPROVEMENT.

I MUST SAY THAT WE ARE MOST GRATIFIED AT THE EXTENT OF PUBLIC CONCERN FOR THE PARK. THE OPPORTUNITY FOR THE PUBLIC TO BE HEARD ON IMPORTANT ISSUES SUCH AS THIS IS, WE FIRMLY BELIEVE, BASIC TO GOOD GOVERNMENT PLANNING, AND I CAN ASSURE YOU THAT THE VIEWS WE HAVE RECEIVED ARE BEING GIVEN THE MOST CAREFUL CONSIDERATION.

OUR EXPERIENCE WITH THIS PLAN HAS PROVEN BEYOND ANY DOUBT THAT THERE IS A LARGE SEGMENT OF THE PUBLIC WHICH IS VITALLY CONCERNED ABOUT THE MANAGEMENT OF OUR PROVINCIAL PARKS AND OTHER PUBLIC RECREATION RESOURCES. THIS GROWING

CONCERN IS, I BELIEVE, THE LOGICAL PRODUCT OF THE RAPID SOCIAL AND TECHNOLOGICAL CHANGES WHICH HAVE TAKEN PLACE OVER THE LAST TWO DECADES AND WHICH SEEM DESTINED TO ACCELERATE OVER THE YEARS AHEAD. NOT TOO MANY YEARS AGO A VERY LARGE PROPORTION OF ONTARIO'S RESIDENTS LIVED IN RURAL AREAS. OUR NATURAL RESOURCES SEEMED TO BE VIRTUALLY INEXHAUSTIBLE, INCLUDING OUR RECREATION RESOURCES WHICH APPEARED TO BE CAPABLE OF PROVIDING FOR EVERY NEED OF OUR PEOPLE. TO-DAY, HOWEVER, WE HAVE BECOME A NATION OF URBAN DWELLERS WHO ARE INCREASINGLY REMOTE FROM OUR RURAL PAST. WE HAVE COME TO REALIZE THAT OUR RESOURCES CAN BE DEPLETED IF WE FAIL TO ACHIEVE THEIR MOST EFFECTIVE MANAGEMENT. AND WE KNOW THAT THE RECREATIONAL USE OF OUR LANDS REQUIRE OUR MOST CAREFUL PLANNING IF THEY ARE TO SERVE THE EVER GROWING DEMANDS OF OUR PEOPLE WHILE RETAINING THE QUALITY OF ENVIRONMENT WHICH WE CONSIDER SO IMPORTANT.

WHAT ARE THESE RECREATION DEMANDS? WHAT WILL THEY BE BY THE YEAR 2000? WE NEED ANSWERS TO THESE QUESTIONS. IT IS NOT ENOUGH TO MEASURE THE NUMBER OF PARTICIPANTS IN GIVEN RECREATION

ACTIVITIES - SUCH AS CAMPERS IN PROVINCIAL PARKS - AND CALL THIS DEMAND. SUCH MEASURES, WHILE THEY CAN BE USEFUL INDICATORS, MERELY REPRESENT A PUBLIC RESPONSE TO THE KIND AND AMOUNT OF OPPORTUNITIES AVAILABLE FOR RECREATION. THEY DO NOT TELL US HOW MANY PEOPLE ARE CONSTRAINED FROM OUTDOOR RECREATION PARTICIPATION BECAUSE OF THE FAILURE TO PROVIDE OTHER KINDS OF OPPORTUNITIES, OR TO PROVIDE ADDITIONAL OPPORTUNITIES IN PARTICULAR LOCATIONS. WE BELIEVE THAT, IN THIS INCREASINGLY COMPLEX SOCIETY IN WHICH WE LIVE, OUTDOOR RECREATION IS A NECESSARY PART OF "THE GOOD LIFE".

IN ORDER TO PROVIDE US WITH ANSWERS CONCERNING RECREATION DEMAND, THE GOVERNMENT HAS INITIATED A TOURISM AND OUTDOOR RECREATION DEMAND STUDY WHICH WILL LEAD TO THE PREPARATION OF A MASTER TOURISM AND OUTDOOR RECREATION PLAN FOR ONTARIO. THIS STUDY IS A JOINT UNDERTAKING OF THE SEVERAL INVOLVED DEPARTMENTS OF THE ONTARIO GOVERNMENT, INCLUDING THE DEPARTMENT OF LANDS AND FORESTS. THIS IS A VERY COMPLEX STUDY WHICH WILL REQUIRE SEVERAL YEARS FOR ITS COMPLETION. HOWEVER, I WOULD MAKE PARTICULAR

NOTE OF THE FACT THAT WE WILL NOT BE "MARKING TIME" UNTIL THIS STUDY IS COMPLETED. IN THE FIRST PLACE, THE STUDY METHOD IS DESIGNED TO YIELD INTERIM INFORMATION WITH DIRECT APPLICATION TO THE RECREATION PLANNING PROCESS. ALSO, MY DEPARTMENT WILL CONTINUE THE DEVELOPMENT OF ITS PROVINCIAL PARK AND OTHER OUTDOOR RECREATION PROGRAMS. WITH RESPECT TO THESE PROGRAMS, I WOULD EMPHASIZE THAT WE ARE CONCERNED WITH THE PROVISION OF OPPORTUNITIES FOR OUTDOOR RECREATION DURING ALL SEASONS OF THE YEAR. OUR PARKS ARE, OF COURSE, AVAILABLE FOR WINTER USE AND IN SOME CASES SPECIAL FACILITIES ARE OPERATED - SUCH AS THE SKIING FACILITIES AT PINERY PROVINCIAL PARK. WE INTEND TO PROVIDE IMPROVED FACILITIES TO PERMIT GREATER WINTER USE OF OUR PARKS. AS AN EXAMPLE OF ONE VERY POPULAR WINTER PROGRAM, THIS PAST YEAR WE OPERATED THREE MAJOR TRAILS FOR THE USE OF SNOWMOBILES.

I WOULD LIKE TO BRIEFLY REFER TO OUR OVERALL PARK PROGRAM WHICH, IN 1969, WILL INVOLVE THE OPERATION OF 96 PROVINCIAL PARKS WHOSE TOTAL AREA IS SOME 8 1/2 MILLION ACRES. IN ADDITION, WE HAVE SET ASIDE FOR FUTURE PARK DEVELOPMENT ANOTHER 66 AREAS TALLING OVER 1 MILLION ACRES

AND WE ARE CONTINUING TO AUGMENT THESE RESERVES THROUGH LAND ACQUISITION AND PUBLIC LAND RESERVATIONS. IN 1968, ABOUT 9 1/2 MILLION VISITATIONS WERE RECORDED IN THE PROVINCIAL PARKS, A FIGURE WHICH IS EXCEEDED IN CANADA ONLY BY THE NATIONAL PARK SYSTEM - AND WE USUALLY RUN A VERY CLOSE SECOND. THE 85 PARKS OFFERING CAMPING FACILITIES WERE USED BY ALMOST 1 MILLION CAMPERS. OUR 17,000 INDIVIDUAL CAMPSITES CAN ACCOMMODATE OVER 70,000 CAMPERS AT ANY ONE TIME. OUR PARKS CONTAIN A TOTAL OF 58 MILES OF SWIMMING BEACHES, 1500 MILES OF CANOE ROUTES AND 131 MILES OF NATURE TRAILS AND HIKING TRAILS. OUR PARK INTERPRETIVE PROGRAM, WHICH AIMS AT PROMOTING, AMONG PARK VISITORS, A FULLER UNDERSTANDING OF PARKS AND THEIR HISTORICAL, CULTURAL AND NATURAL ENVIRONMENTS, SERVED THE NEEDS OF OVER 600,000 VISITORS IN THE 9 PARKS WHERE SPECIAL INTERPRETIVE PERSONNEL WERE STATIONED IN 1968. I AM EXCEEDINGLY PROUD OF OUR PROVINCIAL PARK PROGRAM AND CONSIDER IT TO BE A VITAL PART OF THE OVERALL ^{PROGRAMS} ~~PROGRAMS~~ OF MY DEPARTMENT.

THE EMPHASIS IN OUR PARK SYSTEM IS ON THE NATURAL ENVIRONMENT, AND WE ATTEMPT, IN OUR

DEVELOPMENT AND MANAGEMENT, TO CAREFULLY PROTECT THIS ENVIRONMENT WHILE PROVIDING FOR THE BASIC NEEDS OF PARK VISITORS. WE KNOW FROM OUR SURVEYS OF CAMPERS THAT THIS TYPE OF ENVIRONMENT IS A MAJOR FACTOR IN THEIR ENJOYMENT OF OUR PARKS. THERE IS A REAL DESIRE TO "GET AWAY FROM IT ALL".

I SHOULD ALSO EMPHASIZE THAT THERE ARE MANY DIFFERENT KINDS OF PARKS IN THE PROVINCIAL PARK SYSTEM. IN SIZE THEY RANGE FROM THE 5-ACRE PORT BRUCE PARK ON THE NORTH SHORE OF LAKE ERIE TO THE 7,000 SQUARE MILE POLAR BEAR PARK ON THE SHORES OF HUDSON AND JAMES BAY. THEY VARY FROM VERY INTENSIVELY USED BEACH PARKS, SUCH AS WASAGA BEACH TO THE SUB-ARCTIC TUNDRA OF POLAR BEAR WHICH IS A PRIMITIVE, OR WILDERNESS, PARK SET ASIDE TO PRESERVE THE UNIQUE FLORA AND FAUNA OF THE AREA. THEY VARY FROM HIGHLY DEVELOPED ROADSIDE CAMPING PARKS SUCH AS CHUTES NEAR ESPANOLA TO THE SEMI-WILDERNESS CANOE COUNTRY OF QUETICO AND ALGONQUIN. THESE MANY DIFFERENT KINDS OF PARKS REPRESENT A PLANNED APPROACH TO ACHIEVING A BALANCED PARK SYSTEM WHICH SERVES THE DIVERSE, AND SOMETIMES

CONFLICTING, NEEDS OF THE PARK VISITOR.

WHILE WE ATTEMPT WITHIN THE PROVINCIAL PARK SYSTEM, TO PROTECT AREAS OF OUTSTANDING RECREATIONAL, EDUCATIONAL AND SCIENTIFIC SIGNIFICANCE AND PROVIDE ADEQUATE LANDS TO SERVE THE MANY KINDS OF PUBLIC RECREATION DEMAND, IT SHOULD ALSO BE NOTED THAT WE ARE MOST FORTUNATE IN ONTARIO TO HAVE A VERY LARGE AREA OF PUBLIC, OR CROWN, LANDS. THESE LANDS TOTAL SOME 365,000 SQUARE MILES AND REPRESENT 89% OF THE TOTAL AREA OF THE PROVINCE. MY DEPARTMENT IS RESPONSIBLE FOR THE MANAGEMENT OF CROWN LAND, AND OUR POLICIES ARE DIRECTED TOWARD THEIR OPTIMUM USE FOR A WIDE RANGE OF PURPOSES. THESE INCLUDE TIMBER PRODUCTION FOR OUR IMPORTANT FOREST INDUSTRY, FISH AND WILDLIFE PRODUCTION AND THE ASSOCIATED RECREATION, THE ALLOCATION OF LANDS FOR PRIVATE SUMMER RESORT USE, AND GENERAL PUBLIC RECREATION. THESE LANDS MUST BE MANAGED TO PROVIDE AS MUCH OUTDOOR RECREATION USE AS POSSIBLE WITHIN A PLAN WHICH WILL PROVIDE FOR OPTIMUM RESOURCE USE.

TO RETURN TO ALGONQUIN PARK, THE CONFLICTING VIEWS OF THE VARIOUS INTERESTS GROUPS AND

THEIR CRITICISM OF THE PROPOSALS CONTAINED WITHIN THE PROVISIONAL MASTER PLAN FOR THE PARK HAVE HIGHLIGHTED THE CONTROVERSY SURROUNDING THE FUTURE OF THIS AREA. THESE VIEWS HAVE TENDED TO POLARIZE AROUND THE QUESTION OF LOGGING OPERATIONS IN THE PARK - THE FOREST INDUSTRY AND OTHER AFFECTED GROUPS HOLDING THE VIEW THAT LOGGING SHOULD CONTINUE WITH AS FEW CONSTRAINTS AS POSSIBLE AND THE WILDERNESS EXPONENTS VOICING THE OPINION THAT LOGGING SHOULD EITHER BE COMPLETELY EXCLUDED FROM THE PARK OR THE AREA ALLOCATED TO THIS ACTIVITY BE ^{CONSIDERABLY} ~~CONSIDERABLE~~ REDUCED. IN BETWEEN THESE EXTREMES ARE THE VIEWS OF OTHER INTEREST GROUPS SUCH AS THE LEASEHOLDERS - INCLUDING THE COTTAGERS, RESORT OWNERS, AND YOUTH CAMP OPERATORS - THE REPRESENTATIVES OF REGIONAL TOURIST ASSOCIATIONS, AND MANY OTHER INDIVIDUALS AND GROUPS WHO EITHER USE THE PARK OR ARE INDIRECTLY AFFECTED BY ANY PLAN PROPOSED FOR THE AREA.

IF ONE CLEAR FACT EMERGES FROM THE MANY REPRESENTATIONS WHICH HAVE BEEN MADE, IT IS THAT NO PLAN, REGARDLESS OF HOW GOOD IT IS, CAN FULLY SATISFY THE CONFLICTING DEMANDS OF THE MANY INTEREST GROUPS. HOWEVER, OUT OF SUCH DISCUSSIONS AND CONTROVERSIES INTERESTS TEND TO BE MUCH BETTER CLARIFIED AND UNDERSTOOD. THE PRODUCT, IN TERMS OF A VIABLE MASTER PLAN, WILL MOST CERTAINLY REQUIRE CAREFUL COMPROMISE -- AS DO MOST DECISIONS. IF WE ACCEPT THE THESIS THAT THE PLAN MUST BE SO DESIGNED AS TO BEST SERVE THE OVERALL PUBLIC INTEREST - AND I THINK THAT WE MUST ACCEPT THIS PRINCIPLE - THEN WE MUST ALSO RECOGNIZE THAT NO ONE PARTICULAR INTEREST GROUP CAN BE FULLY SERVED. THIS IS NOT TO SUGGEST THAT WE ARE INTENDING TO PRODUCE A DOCUMENT WHICH ATTEMPTS TO GIVE "A LITTLE BIT TO EVERYONE AND NOT MUCH TO ANYONE". THIS IS NOT PLANNING, NOR WILL IT PROVIDE THE ESSENTIAL GUIDELINES REQUIRED FOR THE EFFECTIVE MANAGEMENT OF THIS IMPORTANT RECREATION RESOURCE.

THE PROVISIONAL MASTER PLAN CAN IN NO WAY

BE VIEWED AS A COMPLETE AND FINAL DOCUMENT. IN THE FIRST INSTANCE, WE ARE WELL AWARE THAT THERE ARE MANY GAPS IN THE INFORMATION PRESENTED IN THE DOCUMENT. THESE WERE POINTED OUT IN A NUMBER OF THE BRIEFS SUBMITTED AND, I MIGHT ADD, WERE KNOWN TO MY STAFF MEMBERS WHO PREPARED THE PLAN AS A ~~BASES~~^{BASIS} FOR PUBLIC DISCUSSION.

I HAVE APPOINTED A TASK FORCE OF SENIOR OFFICIALS AND HAVE DIRECTED THEM TO PREPARE A REVISED PROVISIONAL MASTER PLAN, TAKING INTO ACCOUNT THE VIEWS WHICH WE HAVE RECEIVED FROM THE PUBLIC, AND INCORPORATING ALL PERTINENT INFORMATION WHICH IS NOW AVAILABLE OR CAN BE ASSEMBLED OVER THIS PRELIMINARY PLANNING PERIOD THIS WILL NOT, HOWEVER, BE A FINAL PLAN. I HAVE FURTHER DIRECTED THAT THIS TASK FORCE IDENTIFY THOSE INFORMATION AREAS WHICH ARE EITHER LACKING OR INCOMPLETE IN ORDER THAT WE MAY LAUNCH A CONCERTED RESEARCH PROGRAM TO PROVIDE THE REQUISITE INFORMATION FOR THE FINAL PLAN FOR WHICH OUR TARGET DATE IS 1975.

IN THE PREPARATION OF BOTH THE REVISED PROVISIONAL PLAN AND THE SUBSEQUENT FINAL PLAN, WE INTEND TO SEEK OUT AND UTILIZE EXPERTISE FROM OUTSIDE THE GOVERNMENT AS WELL AS FROM WITHIN. THUS CERTAIN AREAS OF RESEARCH WILL BE DONE BY CONSULTANTS WITH SPECIALIZED CAPABILITIES.

WITHOUT IN ANY WAY COMPROMISING THE WORK OF THE TASK FORCE, I SHOULD STATE QUITE CLEARLY THAT MY DEPARTMENT BELIEVES IN THE PRINCIPLE OF MULTIPLE USE. THIS IS A MUCH MISUNDERSTOOD PRINCIPLE. WITH RESPECT TO LAND, MULTIPLE USE REFERS TO A SCHEME OF MANAGEMENT UNDER WHICH LANDS ARE USED FOR THE PRIMARY PURPOSE FOR WHICH THEY ARE BEST SUITED AND FOR SUCH ADDITIONAL PURPOSES AS DO NOT CONFLICT WITH THE BEST, OR OPTIMUM, USE. MULTIPLE USE DOES NOT MEAN THAT ALL POSSIBLE USES OF A TRACT OF LAND SHOULD TAKE PLACE SIMULTANEOUSLY, AND USE OF INDIVIDUAL AREAS FOR A SINGLE PURPOSE MAY OCCUR IN A MULTIPLE USE SCHEME.

MY DEPARTMENT'S POLICY WITH RESPECT TO PARKS HAS BEEN SET OUT, IN PART, IN OUR SYSTEM OF PARK CLASSIFICATION AND OF ZONING LANDS WITHIN PARKS. THIS POLICY RECOGNIZES RECREATION AS THE PRIMARY USE OF ALL PARK LANDS AND PROVIDES FOR THE ALLOCATION OF CERTAIN KINDS OF PARKS AND CERTAIN TYPES OF AREAS WITHIN PARKS TO VERY RESTRICTED USE CATEGORIES WHICH STIPULATE SINGLE PURPOSE RECREATIONAL USE. AN EXAMPLE OF THIS IS OUR PRIMITIVE (OR WILDERNESS) CLASS OF PARK AND THE PRIMITIVE ZONES WITHIN PARKS SUCH AS ALGONQUIN. IN OTHER PARK ZONES WE CLEARLY RECOGNIZE THE NEED FOR GOOD FOREST MANAGEMENT WHICH WILL PERMIT THE ECONOMIC UTILIZATION OF THE FOREST RESOURCES AND, AT THE SAME TIME, PROVIDE FOR THE FOREST RENEWAL NECESSARY TO ACHIEVE AN AESTHETICALLY ACCEPTABLE, HEALTHY FOREST ENVIRONMENT. I SHOULD ALSO NOTE THAT MANY SPECIES OF WILDLIFE REQUIRE FOREST OPERATIONS TO PROVIDE SUITABLE HABITAT. FOR EXAMPLE, DEER REQUIRE YOUNG FOREST VEGETATION FOR FOOD, AND THIS IS LACKING IN THE MATURE FOREST. PRIOR TO THE INSTITUTION OF FOREST PROTECTION MEASURES, FIRES WERE THE PRINCIPAL MEANS BY WHICH SATISFACTORY FOOD

CONDITIONS WERE MAINTAINED. IN THE ABSENCE OF FIRE, LOGGING IS THE MEANS BY WHICH THIS CAN BEST BE ACCOMPLISHED. ONE IMPORTANT FACTOR IN THE RELATIVE DECLINE OF THE DEER HERD ALONG HIGHWAY 60 IN THE PARK IS THE CHANGING FOREST CONDITIONS IN THAT PARTICULAR AREA. WE BELIEVE, THEREFORE, THAT LOGGING AND RECREATION CAN CO-EXIST, SUBJECT OF COURSE TO GOOD PLANNING AND MANAGEMENT.

IN CLOSING, I WOULD AGAIN EMPHASIZE THE COMPLEXITY OF THE LONG RANGE PLANNING PROCESS IN ALGONQUIN PARK. THERE ARE MANY FACTORS INVOLVED - ECOLOGICAL, SOCIAL, CULTURAL AND ECONOMIC - BOTH INTERNAL TO THE PARK AND EXTERNA OUR OBJECTIVE IS TO PRODUCE THE BEST POSSIBLE PLAN WHICH WILL SERVE THE NEEDS OF PEOPLE AND PROTECT THIS GREAT RECREATIONAL RESOURCE. THE TASK FORCE WHICH I HAVE APPOINTED REPRESENTS A WIDE RANGE OF EXPERIENCE AND SKILL IN NATURAL RESOURCE PLANNING. THEY WILL BE ASSISTED IN THEIR ENDEAVOURS BY THE MANY EXCELLENT OPINIONS WHICH WE HAVE RECEIVED FROM A VITALLY CONCERNED PUBLIC. THEY WILL ^{SEEK}~~SEE~~ OUT SUCH OTHER EXPERTISE AS THEY REQUIRE TO CARRY OUT THEIR WORK.

I AM CONFIDENT THAT THEY WILL PRODUCE A PLAN WHICH WILL EFFECTIVELY MEET THE NEEDS OF THE PEOPLE OF ONTARIO - NOW AND IN THE FUTURE. ALGONQUIN PARK WHICH WAS SET ASIDE IN 1893 WAS THE FIRST PROVINCIAL PARK ESTABLISHED IN THE PROVINCE. IT IS, PERHAPS, FITTING THAT THIS PARK SHOULD BE IN THE VANGUARD OF OUR PARK MASTER PLANNING PROGRAM.

IN ALGONQUIN PARK A VERY POPULAR VISITOR CENTRE IS SEEN BY ABOUT 1/4 MILLION PEOPLE EVERY YEAR. THROUGH THE CENTRE PARK VISITORS ARE INTRODUCED TO ALGONQUIN'S ENVIRONMENT AND TO ITS MANY RECREATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES. THE CENTRE FEATURES A 15 MINUTE 35 MILLIMETER SLIDE PROGRAM WHICH PRESENTS THE STORY OF ALGONQUIN AND RELATES TO THE VISITOR SOME UNDERSTANDING OF OUR PHILOSOPHY TOWARD ITS MANAGEMENT.
